Policy Statement

It is a requirement of the Western Australian Disability Services Act (1993 amended 2004) that all local government authorities develop and implement a Disability, Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP), to assist in the promotion of access and inclusion of people with a disability and additional needs.

The Shire of Nannup Access and inclusion Plan (DAIP) acts as a framework for the implementation of strategies and actions to ensure people with disability and additional needs are supported to have the same opportunities as others to access services, events, facilities, information, customer service and employment.

The Shire of Nannup Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP) for 2026 – 2030 has a particular focus on nurturing a community where diversity, difference and a sense of identity is respected and valued. These values are underpinned by a commitment from the Shire of Nannup to the creation of fair and equitable access for all residents and visitors to the Shire. The DAIP is reviewed annually, and subject to amendments and advancements.



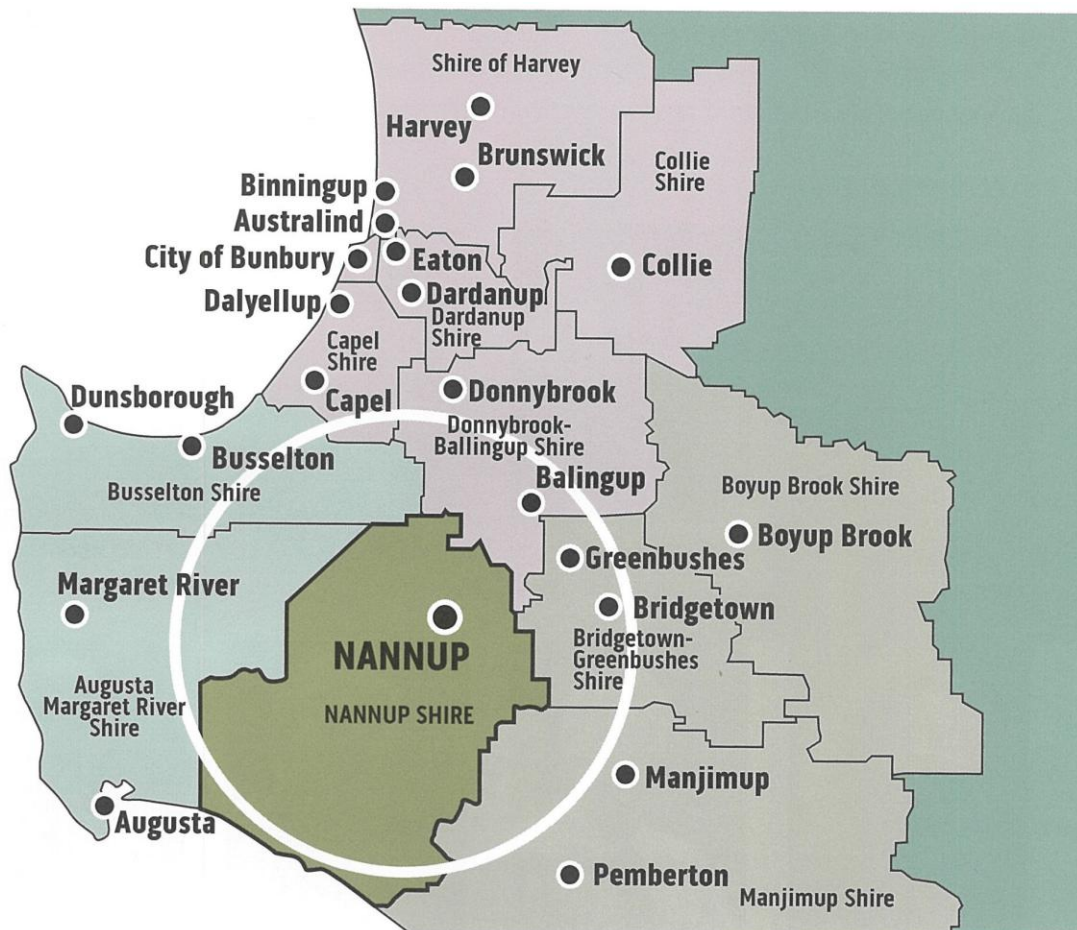
Shire of Nannup

A snapshot

The Shire of Nannup is located on Wardandi and Bibbulmun Country and spans approximately 2,953 square kilometres. It encompasses the town of Nannup and the surrounding localities of Donnelly River, Biddelia, Carlotta, Cundinup, Scott River East, Lake Jasper, Darradup, Barrabup, Peerabeelup, Jalbarragup and East Nannup.

The Shire of Nannup is responsible for maintaining an extensive road network, including over 220 kilometres of unsealed roads and 250 kilometres of sealed roads.

The population of 1,538 (2021 Census) is dispersed across the district, with approximately half of residents living within the Nannup townsite. The name “Nannup” is derived from the Noongar language and is interpreted as “stopping place,” reflecting the area’s cultural significance as a place of gathering and connection.



Our Background

The Shire delivers a broad range of services including customer service, library access, community programs, and recreational activities. It also manages essential public infrastructure such as roads, footpaths, drainage systems, community buildings, and open spaces.

The 2021 Census reported that 126 people in Nannup provided unpaid assistance to a person with a disability, health condition or due to old age. This was 9.4% of our community.

High-quality infrastructure and inclusive service delivery are vital to the social and economic wellbeing of our community. The Shire is committed to ensuring that these assets and services are accessible to all, particularly people with disability and diverse needs. By fostering an environment of equity and inclusion, we aim to enhance the quality of life for all residents and visitors who live, work, and connect within the Shire of Nannup.

What is Access?

Access means that regardless of ability a person can approach, enter, pass to or from and make use of an area and its facilities without assistance.

This includes buildings, recreational facilities, parks, bushland, beaches, footpaths, and other public spaces. Ensuring access means removing physical barriers and designing spaces that accommodate people of all abilities.

What is Inclusion?

Inclusion means that regardless of ability a person has the opportunity to be involved and play an active role within their community

Inclusion is about creating a socially welcoming and respectful community where people of all abilities, backgrounds, and needs are valued and actively encouraged to participate. It means fostering environments where everyone feels they belong, can contribute meaningfully, and are supported to engage in community life without discrimination or exclusion.



Progress in the Shire of Nannup to date

Previous plans have been implemented at the Shire of Nannup since 2013. The plans have enabled progression in the service delivery of the organisation to meet the needs of those with additional needs, living in our Shire and visiting.

Extensive consultation with Shire staff, local agencies, and organisations supporting people with disability, older adults, and carers has informed the development of the Disability Access and Inclusion Plan. A dedicated workshop on 15 July 2025, attended by more than 20 community members, provided valuable insights and lived experiences. This engagement helped ensure that diverse voices were heard and meaningfully reflected in the Shire's future direction.

Since the adoption of the last Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP) in 2021, the Shire of Nannup has made significant progress in creating a more inclusive and accessible community. Events such as the Nannup Family Fun Day and Australia Day Breakfast have been redesigned to ensure wide pathways, shaded seating, accessible toilets, and ACROD parking, with staff trained in Key Word Sign and PECS to support neurodivergent and non-verbal attendees. All event applications now require organisers to demonstrate how their events are inclusive, and the Youth Zone has been established as a welcoming space for young people of all abilities.

Infrastructure improvements include accessible playground equipment, electric doors, handrails, and change tables at Shire facilities, as well as marked kerb crossings for safer mobility. Emergency service buildings are being upgraded to meet accessibility standards, and adaptive trails are being considered for future recreational developments.

Information accessibility has also improved, with Shire documents available in large print, audio, and Easy Read formats, and communications simplified for clarity. Staff receive training on inclusive service delivery, and customer service is tailored to support individuals with diverse needs. Complaints processes have been made more accessible, and public consultations are designed to accommodate all participants.

Employment practices have become more inclusive, with job advertisements promoted through supported networks, adaptive equipment provided, and 9% of the Shire's workforce identifying as having a disability.

Identified challenges

The Shire of Nannup has identified several challenges in delivering its Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP), particularly in the 2022–2023 reporting period. One of the most significant barriers is limited funding, which has delayed the implementation of long-term accessibility projects. While the Shire remains committed to progressing its DAIP, the availability of financial resources continues to impact the pace and scope of infrastructure upgrades and service improvements.

Additionally, the Shire must triage community requests for accessibility improvements, prioritising them based on urgency and feasibility. This reactive approach, while necessary, can slow down proactive planning and delivery. Despite these constraints, the Shire continues to work closely with the community, using feedback to guide decision-making and ensure that the DAIP remains responsive to local needs.

Future constraints identified during the community meeting include access to older buildings in Nannup that are privately owned and not under the Shire’s jurisdiction, such as the Community Resource Centre and the Nannup Hotel. These buildings are heritage-listed, which places restrictions on how their façades can be modified. As a result, implementing simple and practical accessibility solutions—such as ramps or widened entryways—is often not feasible. These limitations present ongoing challenges in improving access for people with disabilities, particularly in high-use community spaces that fall outside Shire’s direct control.

These challenges are anticipated to be ongoing and are included in the review of the Access and Inclusion Plan annually, to ensure that we are reaching targets and/or working towards goals, working within the challenges outlined above.



Strategic Alignment

The Shire of Nannup Disability Access and Inclusion Plan 2026–2029 aligns with and supports the delivery of the **Shire of Nannup Strategic Community Plan 2021–2036**, which sets the long-term vision for an inclusive, connected, and resilient community.

This DAIP contributes directly to the Strategic Community Plan’s key themes by ensuring equitable access, participation, and opportunity for people with disability and additional needs across all areas of community life.

In particular, the DAIP supports the following Strategic Community Plan objectives:

Community

- Fostering a connected, inclusive and supportive community where all people feel valued and able to participate.
- Promoting health, wellbeing and social inclusion through accessible programs, services, and events.

Places and Environment

- Ensuring public spaces, facilities, and infrastructure are safe, accessible, and inclusive for all users.
- Supporting universal design principles in planning, development, and asset management.

Economy

- Encouraging participation in local employment and volunteering opportunities for all community members.
- Supporting local businesses to adopt inclusive and accessible practices.

Leadership

- Delivering inclusive and responsive governance through equitable service delivery and community engagement.
- Strengthening partnerships with community organisations, service providers, and stakeholders to improve access and inclusion outcomes.

By embedding access and inclusion across these strategic themes, the DAIP ensures that the Shire’s commitment to equity is reflected in both planning and day-to-day service delivery.

What is the purpose of the Disability Access and Inclusion Plan?

The DAIP assists the Shire of Nannup to plan and implement improvements to access and inclusion across seven outcome areas. These outcome areas provide a framework for translating the principles and objectives of the Disability Services Act into tangible and achievable results.

The Western Australian Disability Services Act 1993 (amended in 2004) requires public authorities to develop and implement a Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP) that will further both the principles and the objectives of the Act.

1. Services and Events

People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to access the services of, and any event held by a public authority.

2. Buildings and Facilities

People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to access the buildings and facilities of a public authority.

3. Information and Communication

People with disability receive information from a public authority in a format that will enable them to access the information as readily as other people are able to access it.

4. Quality of Service

People with disability receive the same level and quality of service from a public authority as other people receive.

5. Complaints

People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to make complaints to a public authority.

6. Participate in Public Consultation

People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to participate in public consultation by a public authority.

7. Employment

People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to obtain and maintain employment at a public authority

Objective: Improve access to the Shire's Services and Events for all in our community

People with disability and additional needs have the same opportunities as other people to access the services of, and any events organised and endorsed by the Shire of Nannup.
