DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION – LOT 4207 (354 & 370) BARRABUP ROAD, NANNUP PROPOSED CAMPING GROUND, CARAVAN PARK, ABLUTIONS BLOCK, CAMP KITCHEN, CAFÉ & RURAL PRODUCE STORE

I refer to your letter dated 24 March 2025 seeking the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions' (DBCA) comments in relation to a development application for the above property.

The following recommendations and comments are provided pursuant to DBCA's responsibilities under the *Conservation and Land Management Act 1984* (CALM Act) and the *Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016 (BC Act)*.

It is noted that Barrabup Road, Gracillis Road and Mowen Road are identified as an emergency exit route as part of the Bushfire Emergency Plan. Gracilis Road is ungazetted and lies wholly within the Jarrahwood State Forest which is managed by DBCA. DBCA SW is supportive, in principle, of the Shire managing and maintaining Gracilis Road, subject to CALM Act licence and ultimate excision from State Forest. The proponents of the proposed development and the Shire of Nannup should continue to liaise with the Blackwood District of DBCA regarding this exit route.

The proposed development should not impact upon the adjoining State forest areas. The proponent is to liaise with the Blackwood District of DBCA regarding access to Lot 103 through the State forest. No clearing or widening of the existing access should occur without prior consultation with DBCA.

The introduction of weeds, feral animals (containment of cats, dogs, horses and other stock by suitable boundary fencing), dieback hygiene and management and more frequent fires are issues that may impact upon the adjoining State Forest and are to be considered as part of this development.

This proposal indicates development will be contained within existing cleared areas to avoid further clearing within the lot, although clearing for bushfire management is likely to occur for access and asset protection. It is recommended that no further clearing occur for asset protection, placing camping sites within suitable setbacks outlined in the Bushfire Management Plan (Bushfire Prone Planning, 10<sup>th</sup> January 2025).

The proposed development application area contains some remnant vegetation which is habitat for endangered and vulnerable black cockatoos, listed as threatened fauna.

The following advice note is recommended.

#### Advice Note

Vegetation within the proposed development area provides habitat for endangered and vulnerable listed black cockatoos, which are listed as a threatened species under the *Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016* (BC Act).

Immediately prior to vegetation clearing occurring, pre-clearance checks should be undertaken to determine the presence of threatened fauna that may be adversely impacted by these works. Checks should include looking for black cockatoos and their hollows in vegetation to be cleared.

If found to be present, threatened fauna should be encouraged to disperse into the surrounding vegetation prior to any works commencing. Upon commencement, any vegetation clearing should be undertaken in such a manner that allows the dispersal of threatened fauna. If fauna does not disperse, a fauna spotter holding authorisation may need to be contacted to manage displaced threatened fauna.

The taking (including capturing or killing) of threatened fauna is regulated under the BC Act. For further information regarding responsibilities relate to threatened fauna please email speciesandcommunities@dbca.wa.gov.au

I am writing in response to the development application for Loose Goose - Lot 4027 (354 & 370 Barrabup Road, Nannup), which includes plans for a camping ground, caravan park, ablutions block, camp kitchen, café, and rural produce store.

Firstly, we would like to express our full support for the **Loose Goose Chalets initiative**. This development has great potential to increase accommodation capacity for local events while contributing to economic growth and community engagement in our region.

However, we have some questions and suggestions that we believe are important for ensuring the long-term sustainability and safety of this project:

#### 1. Sustainability Plans

- Could you please share details about the water conservation strategy? For example, are there measures in place to collect and utilize rainwater?
- o Do you have an estimate of the annual water usage for the development?
- What are the plans for waste management and sewage? While we note that bins will be available and taken to the waste facility, will environmentally sustainable practices also be implemented?

#### 2. Traffic, Trails, and Wildlife Preservation

- o Given the potential for increased traffic along Barrabup Road, have you considered creating new or improving existing bushwalking trails into town? This could encourage pedestrian and bicycle access while reducing vehicle use to and from the campsite.
- With Barrabup Road being a known crossing point for local wildlife, such as emus and kangaroos, will the council implement measures to minimize fatal injuries to these animals? For example, are there plans for wildlife crossings, speed controls (e.g., speed bumps), or signage to raise driver awareness?

We greatly appreciate your consideration of these points, as they are vital to ensuring the development aligns with the Shire of Nannup's Strategic Community Plan 2012–2036, as well as the Shire's vision: "To foster a community that acknowledges its heritage, values, and lifestyles whilst encouraging sustainable development."

We look forward to hearing how these aspects will be addressed and would like to thank Kieran and Lyn Curtis in advance for the positive contribution they are making to our community through this initiative.

To whom it may concern:

With regard to the Development application for Lot 4027 Barrabup Road Nannup, we have several concerns that many of the North Nannup residents will be adversely affected by the loss of the area's peaceful amenity, one which attracts residents to the area.

Our concerns are as follows-

Barrabup Road is a narrow, winding road which currently presents safety issues for pedestrians, cyclists and wildlife. A significant increase in traffic on this road is undesirable. Assumedly, there will be trade vehicles, service vehicles and trucks involved in developing and maintaining Lot 4027 as a camping ground and when it is open, a large number of recreational vehicles will almost certainly result in an increase in wildlife casualties, which is distressing for the permanent residents of North Nannup.

The proposed development is in a bushfire zone. In the event of a bushfire incident in the area, it is already a concern that residents only have only Barrabup Road as an exit from North Nannup. Having to evacuate large numbers of people out of the area in a hurry would be very problematic, especially if a number of caravans were included. Additionally, in the event of a fire emergency, the proposed caravan park may require inordinate amounts of limited fire fighting resources, thereby disadvantaging residential properties in North Nannup. An increasingly hotter climate will add further risk and complications as climate change progresses.

The applicants are hoping to have the cafe hours to be open 7am to midnight, 7 days a week. This could also increase traffic numbers on Barrabup Road and possibly drink driving situations.

The proposed exit road from the camping area seems as though it will significantly impact the flora and fauna at that site. The area is a wetlands in winter and a breeding ground for ducks and long-necked turtles. There are also some very old growth paperbark trees growing there and these need to be protected from the development of an access road and the compaction that will occur. The nutrients from ablution block septics may also have a detrimental effect on flora if sites aren't chosen with tree health an important consideration .

The bushland adjacent to Lot 4027, that extends to the river, is possibly going to attract tourists on foot and in vehicles. The area is a 'clean on entry', dieback free zone and will be put at risk by increased traffic. Dogs off leash will adversely affect the wildlife in the area. An possible increase in the number of patrons with off road motorbikes would also be an unwelcome change to the area.

Finally, we are concerned with the expansion potential of the proposed development should the adjoining property be put up for sale, noting the proximity of the park site to the neighbour's fence line.

All things considered, we find it difficult to support a proposed development that has the potential to reduce the appeal of the North Nannup locality for permanent residents.

I refer to your email dated 24 March 2025 regarding the submission of a Bushfire Management Plan (BMP) (Version 1.0), prepared by Bushfire Prone Planning and dated 10 January 2025, for the above development application.

This advice relates to the *State Planning Policy 3.7 Bushfire* (SPP 3.7) and associated *Planning for Bushfire Guidelines* (Guidelines).

It is the responsibility of the proponent to ensure the proposal complies with relevant planning and building requirements. This advice does not exempt the applicant/proponent from obtaining approvals that apply to the proposal including planning, building, health or any other approvals required by a relevant authority under written laws.

#### **Assessment**

- DFES acknowledges that the site currently operates as a function centre and short stay
  accommodation facility and that the development application seeks to expand
  accommodation options with the addition of a caravan park and to expand of the function
  centre to include café operations and a farm produce store.
- The decision maker has confirmed this proposal to be an intensification of development and the application of SPP 3.7 is triggered.
- DFES has not assessed the function centre as it has not been addressed within the BMP.
   SPP 3.7 and the guidelines should be applied if the application will:
  - o Result in the intensification of development (or land use); or
  - o Result in an increase of visitors, residents or employees; or
  - Adversely impact or increase the bushfire risk to the subject or surrounding site(s).
- Further clarification is required within the BMP of the requirements of SPP 3.7, and the supporting Guidelines as outlined in our assessment below.

However, the requirements for compliance with Siting and Design, in isolation does not allow for consideration of the overall location of the site and the broader landscape. #### A3.3a and A3.3b - does not comply

DFES notes that the length of the no-through road is greater than 200 metres and is not within BAL-LOW or within a residential built out area.

Additionally, it has not been demonstrated that the no-through road has a turn-around area as per Figure 30.

#### A3.5 - not demonstrated

The BMP has not clearly stated whether an outcomes-based approach is being applied.

Modification to the BMP is required.

Where A3.2, A3.3a and A3.4 (if required), cannot be achieved and more than 100 guests and employees are proposed, and/or the bushfire planning practitioner considers an on-site shelter not necessary, an outcomes-based approach can be prepared.

Section 5.4.1 of the BMP references a Performance Based Assessment. Additionally, there are references to Guidelines for Planning in Bushfire Prone Areas v1.4 which are no longer relevant and should be removed from the BMP.

The BMP uses a Qualitative assessment titled 'A Qualitative Assessment of the Performance of the 'Acceptable Solutions: of Element 3 in ensuring vehicular access/ egress route availability and safe use in a bushfire event'.

The assessment provided does not align with the Guidelines or provide any contingency measure to mitigate the risk, instead it attempts to justify the non-compliance. The use of the table colours of risk level (table 2) compared to residual risk (table 3) appears misleading. If a risk is identified as 'Very High' and coloured red in assessment Table 2 and the risk level remains 'equivalent' in the performance assessment in Table 3, the colour should remain red. Instead, the colour changes to a yellow which gives the opinion of a lower residual risk.

As per Policy Measure 7.5, where an outcomes-based approach is used, an assessment is to be undertaken in accordance with the policy, and the following criteria:

- a) Address the acceptable solution to the greatest extent possible:
- b) Identify the non-compliance with the acceptable solutions and why these cannot be achieved;
- c) Detail how the design addresses bushfire risk and where additional bushfire risk management measures have been deemed necessary and included to minimise the risk:
- d) Detail if there are any community net-benefits, such as improvements to the public road network;
- e) Include any fire engineering solutions or written evidence such as publications and State Administrative Tribunal decisions to support the proposal (where applicable);

The proposed development has not demonstrated compliance with Bushfire Protection Criteria 8: Development – Vulnerable tourism land uses and day uses.

In addition, the decision maker is to be satisfied that the location and broader landscape is suitable for the proposed development (vulnerable land use) which is in a bushfire prone area with an extreme bushfire hazard on multiple aspects that is considered to present an unacceptable risk to people, property and infrastructure.
