The Village Green	Acknowledges Min & Fred Green who lived across the road and is a traditional Village Green in the middle of town.

Other names have been deleted from the list due to the following comments from Landgate:

Landgate are supportive of the names contained in your attached spreadsheet except –

- Family Picnic Park may be too generic and misses an opportunity to apply a meaningful commemorative name.
- Tennis Court Park may be seen as being part of the tennis club and not a community park.
- Barbara Dunnet Park Policy excludes elected members from being commemorated (note that name could be considered if supported with evidence of community work)
- Tomasi essentially paid employment as the reasons provided, again could be considered if due to community work.

With regards to community involvement, generally the personal names mentioned above would no doubt have been involved with, for example RSL, Church groups, fundraisers, sporting clubs, that would enable consideration for commemorative naming. While we do allow naming of parks after living people, please be mindful of setting precedence within the community when there may be limited opportunities to recognise many contributors to Nannup.

Names have been edited or deleted from the list due to the following comments from Landgate:

- Names related to former Councillors and land owners are not supported by the Policy
- Dave Blythe Park, based on the why, we would suggest consideration for just Blythe Park if Pat was also equal.
- Tiger may be too generic and could mean tiger, tiger snake etc suggest may be Thylacine Park (wouldn't support the use of Land)
- Wardandi, would suggest keeping this name in reserve for a more prominent/significant size park or reserve. Once you use that name you cannot use again in the area.
